Summer Bridge is A GMS transitional program that enables incoming freshmen to gain an insight into the high school lifestyle. It is a lively two weeks where participating students are introduced to film and editing videos, developing essential media skills, collaborating on projects, and taking field trips. Students who have attended Summer Bridge have typically achieved higher grade point averages and attendance rates in their freshmen year. GET LIT

The **Classic Slam** is the climax of **Get Lit**'s very own teaching curriculum. Any school, classroom, or club that has used this method of learning can put together their own poetry work in order to compete at the Classic Slam. In preparation for this event, students have worked to memorize a Classic poem and write their response—in the form of an original Spoken Word piece—to be performed on stage.

During the quarter-final rounds, schools from across Los Angeles unite for a day of poetry, community, and competition. The finalists of these stages will qualify for the Classic Slam Finals on **Saturday, April 20**. Here, they will go against each other for the title of Classic Slam Champions. Every poem performed on this date will be evaluated by judges and the winners will be bestowed with cash prizes.

The majority of the students that make up Cleveland's official team consist mainly of GMS students. This is in large part due to the 10th-grade Semester B project, Fighting For Justice. In its duration, **Ms. Thackeray**, who happens to be a mentor for the Get Lit team on campus, will interweave the essential question of "How can I bring awareness to a social injustice and effect positive change?" into the classroom. As burgeoning global citizens, throughout the semester students will produce an interdisciplinary work that sheds light on a form of social, political, economic, or environmental inequity. Students will conduct research, read books, and partake in discussions as a means of achieving a final product. The culminating act of the semester will be a project in which students are recorded performing a spoken word argumentative poem of their own in front of a live audience. A small selection of these recordings will then be used to compose a collaborative documentary addressing social injustice in the students' video production class.

As mentioned above, this is a new endeavor that GMS is embarking on. Because of this, feedback from those present will be even more keenly taken into consideration.

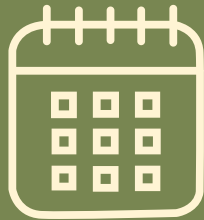

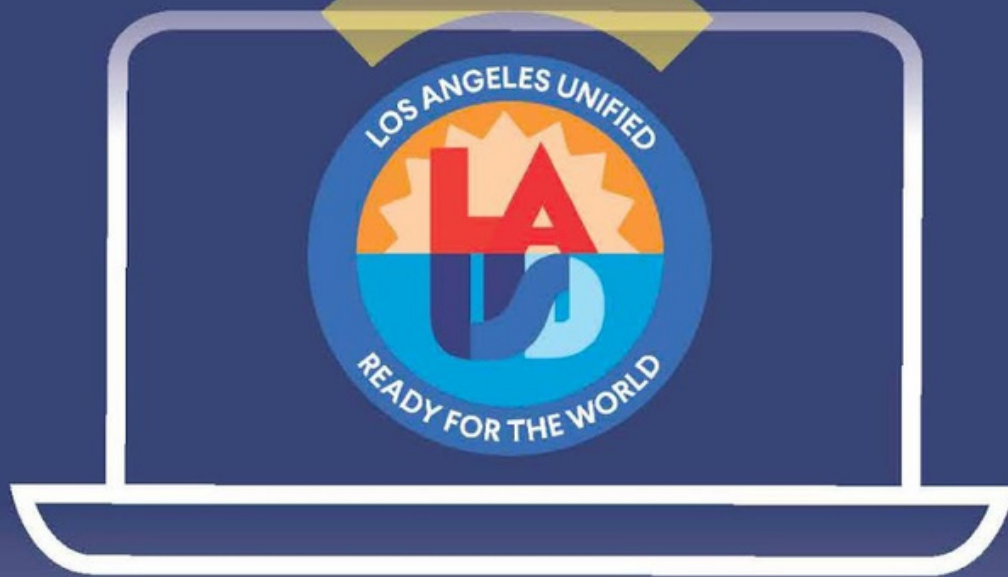

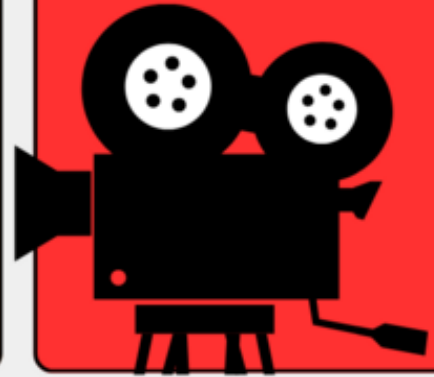
