Since then, however, Unshuttered has branched outwards, offering a comprehensive program, a social media app for submitting works, and a contest aimed at recognizing original photographs from young minds across the United States.

This year, Getty Unshuttered is in search of teen photographers specifically within the state of California to submit a response to their new open call prompt which in itself, has no boundaries. One's image could represent emotion, varied light or color, communities at work, landscapes, or anything that the cameraperson envisions. In the final stages of the contest, a professional panel will select 25 winning works





The Teen Photograph Open Call will be vastly incorporated into the Getty Unshuttered free photo-sharing app. It is a constructive community for teens wishing to share their innovative passions and advocacy for social justice. What differentiates this app from others like it is the fact that it is solely designed for young artists alike. Many have used its features to launch their portfolios to new heights.



Managed by the LA Promise Fund, The Intern Project (ITP) supplies students from LA County high schools with an opening to experience several progressive workspaces. Students are given the adequate learning to be successful in life after graduation with exposure to rigorous academic achievement and career access. Throughout the 8-week program, students build upon their already established skill sets with mock interviews, workshops from professionals in today's most needed jobs, and interactive projects. Not to mention those participating in the internship will be awarded an approved certification and a paid stipend.





The National Science Bowl was created in 1991 to inspire students to dig deeper into the disciplines of science and mathematics, and hopefully motivate them to consider these fields as they grow older. Throughout its 33-year history, the National Science Bowl has proven to be one of the nation's most vigorous science-based competitions, now extending to a total of 344,000 student participants since its introduction.





At the start of every year, thousands of high school students compete in a series of 65 high school regional Science Bowl tournaments. The National Science Bowl is honored to be sponsored by the largest supporter of basic research in the physical sciences across the United States—the U.S.

Department of Energy Office of Science. This year's finals competition will be held at the LADWP John Ferraro Building.

The U.S. Department of Energy National Science Bowl is a nationwide competition that challenges high school students' knowledge in a wide variety of STEM-related subjects. Teams participating consist of four students and a teacher who plays the role of the group's advisor, if necessary participating schools can have an upwards of two other alternative groupings of students. These teams go on to compete against each other in a fast-moving question-and-answer format, testing their skills in the areas of physics, energy, Earth science, chemistry, biology, and math.



Omega Sci-Fi Project

The Omega Sci-Fi Project encourages developing writers to apply their distinct say in the art of science fiction story writing by measuring the challenges our globe and humanity as a whole face in the time ahead.

Los Angeles County high school students are invited to submit their short science fiction stories to achieve The Tomorrow Prize. Intertwining the components of science and art into one being, The Tomorrow Prize is obtainable through submitting an overachieving work that demonstrates the unique issues plaguing us in the 21st century. The finalists of the competition will be honored with their story read by selected celebrity guests at the culminating event, on March 11th, 2024.

Additionally, the first-place winner will have their work published in the L.A. Parent Magazine alongside their \$250 check (second-place will receive \$150 and third-place will receive \$100, respectively).







Origin (2023) is a biographical drama creatively envisioned by Primetime Emmy Award recipient, Ava DuVernay. The film bases itself upon Caste: The Origins of Our Discontents, a book by Isabel Wilkerson that compares racism in the United States to the caste systems of both Nazi Germany and India to argue the presence of a restrictive caste system amid the margins of the American nation itself.

"This [Origin] breaks every screenwriting rule, every rule of filmmaking that I know," claims DuVernay when questioned by reporters of The New Yorker, "My hope is that it instigates some conversation about things we should be focusing on in this country as we head toward an election..."

DuVernay founded her own production company to put the spotlight on films focusing on Black people in 2010, African-American Film Festival Releasing Movement (AFFRM). She has since solidified the true incentive of the organization as a contemporary form of activism. Still, not shying to acknowledge the importance of connections in the industry, in 2015 the company rebranded itself as ARRAY to introduce its expansion into the works of women filmmakers alongside its prior enterprises.



January Booster Club RECAP



70 Years Later—



The Legacy of Brown V. Board of Education

2024 marks the 70th anniversary of the United State Supreme Court's 1954 landmark decision in Brown v. Board of Education. In Brown, a unanimous Supreme Court held that racial segregation in public schools is unconstitutional. The Supreme Court struck down the "separate but equal" doctrine that it had adopted in Plessy v. Ferguson, an 1896 case that addressed whether states could legally require railroad companies to provide equal but separate accommodations for passengers of different races.

Brown v. Board of Education is widely accepted as one of the most momentous Supreme Court decisions, but views differ regarding what impact it has had on the law and our society.

In addressing this topic, discuss what impact you think <u>Brown</u> has had and why. The following are some examples of questions that you could consider in thinking about these issues:

- Did <u>Brown</u> influence changes in the law, or in society, beyond the decision in that case, or were any changes that happened after <u>Brown</u> inevitable?
- Did <u>Brown</u> affect the way that Americans view the Supreme Court, or affect how Supreme Court conducts itself?
- Should the Supreme Court consider how its decision on a particular subject impacts society, or how the decision is viewed by the public?

The 2024 Ninth Circuit Civics Contest is open to high school students in nine western states and two Pacific island jurisdictions. Students from public, private, parochial and charter schools as well as homeschooled students of equivalent grade status may enter.



The United States District and Bankruptcy Courts for the Central District of California will conduct a local contest to select finalists for the circuit-wide competition. To enter the local contest, students must reside in one of the following counties: Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara or Ventura. Winners of the local contest will also receive cash prizes of \$1,000 for 1st place, \$750 for 2nd place, and \$500 for 3rd place. The 1st-place winners of the local contest and a parent/guardian will be invited to the 2024 Ninth Circuit Judicial Conference.

Cleveland Charter HS: SAT School Day Parental Exception Waiver (Opt-Out Form)

Dear Parent/Guardian,

Your teen will have the opportunity to take the SAT college entrance examination during the regular school day. The SAT, which is accepted at some U.S. colleges, measures what students are learning in high school and what they need to know to succeed in college and career. Even at "test-blind" universities that no longer require the SAT (University of California and California State University systems), test scores may be used for course placement or merit scholarships. Taking the SAT exam during the school day can increase students' access to college, address barriers that hinder students from taking the exam, and reduce testing stress, e.g., eliminating financial hardship in paying for the exam, taking the test in a more familiar environment
