

The GirlsBuild Organization challenges girls to make an impact in their community via a project centered around civic engagement, health/wellness, and STEM skills. The program selects upwards of 60 teams nationwide to compete in this project and we know that GMS can contribute enough to be one of them. Essentially, each team selected to participate will receive grant funding as well as training to implement an original, collective-driven, and data-dependent solution to their corresponding challenge. Coordinators, either being school or staff of the nonprofit organization (in our case being Ms. Burney in C6), will receive an allowance to support the project. Participating teams will also have to use professional communication to share their progress through the creation of a blog site and the development of appropriate social media campaigns.

GirlsBuild ensures that your voices are heard and amplified as they state: "We believe young women will define the vision for what our schools, communities, and country can be. Change starts with you!"

Each member of the team equips themselves with a mini-colored flag, clipping it on their waist to hang. Unlike regular football, the girls in flag football are not allowed to tackle each other or make any risky moves of the sort. Instead of getting physical, you pull off the flag on the girl of the opposing team who holds the football at that moment. Whilst Cleveland's been having the gender opposite team for every sport, football was not one included. It wasn't until last school year that the LA City Section CIF added the girls flag football league. A bit of history on Hispanic Heritage Month:

At the forefront of the increasing presence of individuals of Latin-American descent in the U.S. population, the government of Richard Nixon established the "Week of Hispanic Heritage" whilst including the term "Hispanic" as an official contact form of the 1970 Census. Ultimately, the term "Hispanic," in the United States, does not describe a race but is utilized only for the matter of ethnic distinction. Twenty years later, on the 17th of August 1988, President Ronald Reagan extended the celebrations to a month, spanning from Sept. 15 - Oct. 15. The period was altered to make it coincide with the celebrations of the Independence of Mexico, Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua, also to rid of the date known as "Columbus Day."




